ASTHMA POLICY



PURPOSE

To ensure that Trafalgar High School appropriately supports students diagnosed with asthma.

OBJECTIVE

To explain to Trafalgar High School parents/carers, staff and students the processes and procedures in place to support students diagnosed with asthma.

SCOPE

This policy applies to:

- All staff, including casual relief staff, contractors and volunteers
- All students who have been diagnosed with asthma or who may require emergency treatment for asthma and their parents/carers.

POLICY

Asthma

Asthma is a long term lung condition. People with asthma have sensitive airways in their lungs which react to triggers, causing a 'flare-up'. In a flare-up, the muscles around the airway squeeze tight, the airways swell and become narrow and there is more mucus. This makes it hard to breathe. An asthma flare-up can come on slowly (over hours, days or even weeks) or very quickly (over minutes). A sudden or severe asthma flare-up is sometimes called an asthma attack.

Symptoms

Symptoms of asthma can vary over time and often vary from person to person. The most common asthma symptoms are:

- Breathlessness
- Wheezing (a whistling noise from the chest)
- Tight feeling in the chest
- Persistent cough

Symptoms often occur at night, early in the morning or during/just after physical activity. If asthma is well controlled, a person should only have occasional asthma symptoms.

Triggers

A trigger is something that sets off or starts asthma symptoms. Everyone with asthma has different triggers. For most people with asthma, triggers are only a problem when asthma is not well controlled with medication. Common asthma triggers include:

- Exercise
- Smoke (cigarette smoke, wood smoke from open fires, burn-offs or bushfires)
- House dust mites
- Pollens
- Chemicals such as household cleaning products
- Food chemicals/additives
- Laughter or emotions, such as stress
- Colds/flu
- Weather changes such as thunderstorms and cold, dry air
- Moulds
- Animals such as cats and dogs
- Deodorants (including perfumes, after-shaves, hair spray and aerosol deodorant sprays)
- Certain medications (including aspirin and anti-inflammatories)

Asthma management

If a student diagnosed with asthma enrolls at Trafalgar High School:

1. Parents/carers must provide the school with an Asthma Action Plan **annually** which has been completed by the student's medical practitioner. The plan must outline:
 - The prescribed medication taken by the student and when it is to be administered, for example as a pre-medication to exercise or on a regular basis
 - Emergency contact details
 - The contact details of the student's medical practitioner

- The student's known triggers
 - The emergency procedures to be taken in the event of an asthma flare-up or attack.
2. Parents/carers should also provide a photo of the student to be included as part of the student's Asthma Action Plan.
 3. Trafalgar High School will keep all Asthma Action Plans:
 - Front office student files
 - Key notes recorded on Compass
 - Sick Bay
 4. School staff may also work with parents/carers to develop a Student Health Support Plan which will include details on:
 - How the school will provide support for the student
 - Identify specific strategies
 - Allocate staff to assist the student
 Any Student Health Support Plan will be developed in accordance with Trafalgar High School's Healthcare Needs Policy.
 5. If a student diagnosed with asthma is going to attend a school camp or excursion, Trafalgar High School parents/carers are required to provide any updated medical information.
 6. If a student's asthma condition or treatment requirements change, parent/carers must notify the school and provide an updated Asthma Action Plan.
 7. School staff will work with parents/carers to review Asthma Action Plans (and Student Health Support Plans) once a year.

Student asthma kit

All students diagnosed with asthma are required to have a student asthma kit at school which contains:

- Their own prescribed reliever medication labelled with the student's name
- Their spacer (if they use one)

Student asthma kits will be stored in a place decided by the student, i.e. Lockers, laptop bag, school bag.

Asthma emergency response plan

If a student is:

- Having an asthma attack
- Difficulty breathing for an unknown cause, even if they are not known to have asthma

School staff will endeavour to follow the Asthma First Aid procedures outlined in the table below. School staff may contact Triple Zero "000" at any time.

Page Break

Step	Action
1.	Sit the person upright <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be calm and reassuring • Do not leave them alone • Seek assistance from another staff member or reliable student to locate the student's reliever, the Asthma Emergency Kit and the student's Asthma Action Plan (if available). • If the student's action plan is not immediately available, use the Asthma First Aid as described in Steps 2 to 5.
2.	Give 4 separate puffs of blue or blue/grey reliever puffer: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Shake the puffer • Use a spacer if you have one • Put 1 puff into the spacer • Take 4 breaths from the spacer Remember – Shake, 1 puff, 4 breaths
3.	Wait 4 minutes <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If there is no improvement, give 4 more separate puffs of blue/grey reliever as above (or give 1 more dose of Bricanyl or Symbicort inhaler)
4.	If there is still no improvement call Triple Zero "000" and ask for an ambulance. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Tell the operator the student is having an asthma attack • Keep giving 4 separate puffs every 4 minutes until emergency assistance arrives (or 1 dose of Bricanyl or Symbicort every 4 minutes – up to 3 doses of Symbicort)
5.	If asthma is relieved after administering Asthma First Aid, stop the treatment and observe the student. Notify the student's emergency contact person and record the incident

Staff will call Triple Zero “000” immediately if:

- The person is not breathing
- If the person’s asthma suddenly becomes worse or is not improving
- If the person is having an asthma attack and a reliever is not available
- If they are not sure if it is asthma
- If the person is known to have anaphylaxis

Training for staff

Trafalgar High School encourages all staff to hold workplace first aid which includes a unit on basic asthma management. The school will arrange the following asthma management training for staff when identified as appropriate:

Asthma Emergency Kit

The equipment needed for Asthma first aid will be located in the Sick bay, Front office and PE office first aid kits. All mobile first aid kits will also contain this equipment.

The equipment is:

- At least 1 blue or blue/grey reliever medication such as Airomir, Admol or Ventolin
- spacer devices (for single person use only) to assist with effective inhalation of the blue or blue/grey reliever medication (Trafalgar High School will ensure spare spacers are available as replacements). Spacers will be stored in a dust proof container.

Asthma first aid events are to be recorded on Compass, as with all first aid at Trafalgar High School.

First Aid delegated staff will maintain the equipment and ensure safe cleaning after use.

Management of medical information

Confidential medical information provided to Trafalgar High School to support a student diagnosed with asthma will be:

- Recorded on the student’s file and compass
- Copy of asthma management plan placed in Sick Bay student record folder
- Shared with all relevant staff so that they are able to properly support students diagnosed with asthma and respond appropriately if necessary.

Communication plan

This policy will be available on Trafalgar High School’s website so that parents and other members of the school community can easily access information about Trafalgar High School’s asthma management procedures.

Epidemic Thunderstorm Asthma

Trafalgar High School will be prepared to act on the warnings and advice from the Department of Education and Training when the risk of epidemic thunderstorm asthma is forecast as high.
