GAME ON RECYCLING—FREE SPORTS EQUIPMENT RECYCLING FOR SCHOOLS TRIAL

At THS we are collecting old sports equipment to be recycled. If you have any of the accepted items at home, please drop them off to Meg or one of our amazing PE teachers in the sports centre.

The old sports equipment will be sent to a recycling facility in Melbourne, sorted into sporting item categories and tested for re-use or shredding for downstream recycling. The volume that is shredded will then be passed on to Australian manufacturers where it can be used in the manufacturing of new products (yoga mats, fall mats, footwear, sports surface coatings etc), rather than ending up in landfill.

Sports Equipment Recycling Trial - Information for Schools -

About Game On Recycling

Game On Recycling is a partnership between Australia New Zealand Recycling Platform (ANZRP) and Wilson Sporting Goods Co. Recognised as a thought leader in the Product Stewardship sector, ANZRP works alongside government, industry and community groups to reduce waste, improve recycling and better manage environmental impact.

Wilson Sporting Goods Co., a subsidiary of Amer Sports Corporation, is the world's leading manufacturer of high-performance sports equipment, apparel, footwear, and accessories. The Company brings more than a century of innovation, history and heritage across many sports.

Together, these two organisations are forging ahead to make Australia's sport equipment industry a global leader in sustainability.

Financially supported by ANZRP, Wilson Sporting Goods Co, and an Australian Government grant from the National Product Stewardship Investment Fund, the pilot phase of this project started on 1 July 2021 and will continue to 31 March 2023.

Why is used sporting equipment a problem?

There is currently no formal system in place in Australia to collect and recycle the significant volume of sports equipment that is sent to landfill each year. There they cause problems with our ecosystems and the biodiversity that surrounds them.

How will the schools program work?

Collection sites are being established around Australia to collect old and unwanted sporting equipment. Items collected will be sent to ANZRP's processing facilities in Melbourne to be sorted and separated into:

- Items that can be reused and put back into circulation in the community, thereby extending the life of the product; or
- Items that have well and truly come to the end of their life and need to be recycled. This recycled material can then be used in the re-manufacture of new products. We are exploring options with producers of yoga mats, thongs and tennis court surfacing.

During the pilot program, Game On Recycling will work with schools to run collections and report back the types and volumes of sporting equipment collected.

For schools located outside of metro Melbourne, Game On Recycling can provide Reply Paid slips for schools to attach to a cardboard box and send back waste sports equipment through Australia Post. Each box can weigh up to 22kg. We recommend deflating balls to increase the quantity of materials that can fit inside each box.

Unaccepted items:

- A: Air hockey table, Archery
- B: Bocce balls, Bowls/ ten pin bowling equipment, Boxing bags, Boxing speed balls C: Climbing equipment, Clothing, Cricket balls and bats
- D: Drinking bottles
- E: Electronic consoles (Wii Fit/Sports), Electronic items (Fit Bits)
- F: Fishing rods, Fitness weighted balls, Footwear
- G: Golf bags, balls and clubs
- H: Hockey balls and sticks, Hula hoops
- J: Javelin
- L: Large gym equipment (exercise bike/treadmills etc.), Life vests/ floatation devices/ snorkelling/ flippers/ diving equipment
- N: Netting
- P: Pool tables/ cues/ billiard balls, Protective gear (knee pads, elbow pads, helmets, mouth guards)
- R: Roller blades
- S: Shotput/ discus, Skates/ skateboards, Softballs and bats, Sport cones, Sports clothing/ uniforms/ bags, Surf boards, Swimming pool inflatables/ swimming pool noodles
- W: Weight benches, Whistles
- Y: Yoga mats



SCIENCE – UN CONFERENCE
