SAFETY AT SCHOOL CROSSINGS



Baw Baw Shire is committed to providing a safe environment for all students commuting to and from school. To help achieve this we need the community's help.

The Role of School Crossing Supervisors

Crossing Supervisors are there to assist children cross the road in safety on their way to and from school. Children may not understand traffic laws or be aware of their Bus Zone surroundings, and small children may not be readily visible to drivers. In Baw Baw. we have over 31 school crossings where our supervisors attend to help kids cross the road safely.

Safety in School Zones

Due to an increase in traffic at drop off and pick up times, both traffic and parking issues can pose a risk to the safety of children. Educating kids and encouraging safe driving behaviour can help improve safety in the school zone.

Please make sure you are always looking out for Children around School Crossings and never stop on a school crossing (within the red and white posts) and never drive through a School Crossing whilst there are pedestrians on it.

Parking Signs and What They Mean

No parking signs



If there is a 'no parking' sign, you can stop for 2 minutes in that area:

- · if you are picking up or dropping off passengers or goods
- · you stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.

If you stop in, or partly in, an area showing a no parking sign and you are not picking up or dropping off passengers or goods, you are considered to be parked and can be fined. This is the case even if you stay with your vehicle.

No stopping signs



If there is a 'no stopping' sign, you are not allowed to stop or park your car in, or partly in, that area for any reason, including dropping off or picking up passengers



A driver must not stop on a bus stop, or within 20m before the bus stop sign and within 10m after the sign

Baw Baw Shire actively monitors school crossings to ensure the safety of pedestrians and students attending schools.

YEAR 10 OUTDOOR ED SNOWY RIVER CAMP

The Year 10 Outdoor Education class participated in a three day Outward Bound camp on the Snowy River, near Buchan. On day one, students abseiled down a cliff face. They were also introduced to hoochies or bivvy's, which were essentially lightweight tarps, used instead of tents. This added another element to the camping experience. The second day saw the group hike to their whitewater rafting put-in point. After some time transporting and pumping rafts, the group travelled about 7km down the Snowy River in rafts. Most students captained their raft at some point. The journey down the Snowy river ended at the groups next camp site. On the last day, the group hiked up a steep and sustained track, to a rock climbing site. They spent close to two hours rock climbing a range of climbs. Whilst it was challenging at times, it appeared all students enjoyed the experience. Everyone was very well behaved, respectful worked well in group settings.







REGIONAL ATHLETICS

Tuesday the 6th of September 12 of our students competed in the Region level of Athletics. These students did an amazing job to qualify for this round and everyone did an amazing job representing the school in their events. Josh Seymour, Josh Van-Baalen and Piper Albert have all qualified for the State level which will be the 17th of October. Madison Rossi also did amazing coming home with two medals 2nd and 3rd. Josh Seymour has qualified for 1500m and 800m, Josh Van-Baalen and Piper have qualified for Discus and Piper has also qualified for shot put. Thanks to all the students who came and participated and for being so supportive of each other.




